2018 Annual General Meeting



The weekend was filled with friendship, fun and business.

The 2018 Annual General Meeting was held the weekend of March 24-25 at the Saskatoon Inn. Throughout the weekend, the member and leader delegates were asked to vote on a number of decisions.

The first item of business, after the welcome and introductions, was voting for the 18-year-old member delegates to the board of directors. The leaders joined South West Regional 4-H Specialist Kaitlyn Keller for fun and games.

Although it was a late night on Saturday, everyone was up early and ready for the business meetings to continue at 9 a.m. on Sunday.

New to AGM this year, members and leaders participated in the Focus on 4-H Forum. This was an open discussion on suggested policy changes related to Livestock Show Rules, the new pilot General Record Book, and any other topic of interest to our membership.

There were many lively discussions and great suggestions were brought forward! The notes from the discussions were captured for the Board of Directors and staff to use for future meetings.

After the auditor's report and the member and leader recognition, two resolutions were voted on by the delegation. The first resolution was regarding Bylaw #7.16. It was amended to read: Board's Power to terminate or suspend a 4-H Member's Membership or a 4-H Leader's Membership in the 4-H program.

The Board of Directors has the authority to remove a 4-H volunteer, member, or leader subject to the removal policy of the Saskatchewan 4-H Council.

The second resolution was to remove the executive committee of the Board of Directors, which was also passed.

After a final loonie draw and four special announcements, the business meeting was adjourned and everyone was free to go home. Overall, it was a very successful weekend and AGM!



4-H Programs, Events, Travel And More!

4-H Saskatchewan Summer Camp adds a second week in south



More 4-H members had the opportunity to attend 4-H Summer Camp this year.

Due to the previous popularity of 4-H Summer Camp, a second week of camp was added. The first week was held at the Big River Bible Camp facility July 1-6 and the second week was held at the Lumsden Beach Camp facility August 26-31.

Both camps were full, with close to 50 campers at each. The same schedule and activities were used at both locations, with some of the same counsellors attending.

Since the 2017/18 4-H year was Green & Clean, camp was themed around The Lorax quote, "Unless someone like you cares a whole awful lot, nothing is going to get better, it's not."

Sunday was registration day. As the campers arrived, a group of counsellors played games with them. In the evening, the counsellors ran an Amazing Race style game for the campers to learn more about the camp facility. They ended the evening with a campfire, complete with songs.

All of the full days of camp were based around the four 4-H Canada Leadership Pillars — Science & Technology, Sustainable Agriculture & Food Security, Environment & Healthy Living and Communications & Community Engagement. In between 4-H programming, the campers enjoyed some traditional camp activities, from canoeing, archery and crafts, to wide games and campfires.

Monday's theme was Science & Technology. During the day, the campers learned about boats and rocketry. They had to make tinfoil boats in the morn-



ing and tested them to see which could hold the most cargo. Then in the afternoon, they made pop and water bottle rockets before taking them to the sky to see which could fly the best. In the evening, the counselors ran science experiment demonstrations for the campers.

The next day was Sustainable Agriculture & Food Security Day. The 4-H activities started with learning where the ingredients for bannock and butter come from, before shaking cream to make butter and mixing bannock dough. They then headed over to the fire to cook their bannock on sticks before slathering it with their homemade butter.

4-H leaders and members from across the province came together to learn valuable skills to take back to their clubs.

Leaderama was held on December 1 in two locations — North Battleford and Weyburn. Judging and Cattle Health Discussed At Beef Symposium

4-H Saskatchewan held its annual Beef Symposium in Estevan on February 17. Approximately 70 4-H members and leaders, attended this fun and educational event. The event was held in the 60 and Over Club and the Estevan Exhibition Association's indoor horse arena.

Registrants took part in a session on "Meat Quality & Meat Judging", led by Mike Guest and the SCA's own Chad Ross, where members learned to: identify the different grades of meat; differentiate between and judge meat; and experience the Canadian Beef app called "The Roundup." Guest brought four full loins of different grades to the event, so members could understand first-hand the difference between grades.

4-H members also took part in the "Basics of Nutrition" session, led by Julie-Anne Howe of Bar Over 3H Livestock Ltd. Julie-Anne provides nutrition consulting and contract project work for various organizations, including the Nature Conservatory of Canada and Verified Beef Saskatchewan. She shared her knowledge on nutrition and provided samples of the different kinds of feed.

Registrants took part in a session on "Beef Issues Talk" with Leah Clark. Leah is a Livestock Agrologist with the Ministry of Agriculture who spoke about the current trends in the Beef awareness, ranging from health issues to animal rights groups. Leah encouraged all members in attendance to become AGvocates and learned more about, and promote, the beef industry.

Members also took part in quick sessions put on by 4-H Saskatchewan staff. "4-H Judging 101" was led by the South West Regional 4-H

Specialist, Kaitlyn Keller, and "Fun with Beef" was led by the South East Regional 4-H Specialist, Melodi Hawkesford-Lee.

The pinnacle of the day was when members judged three classes of beef animals: Fat Steers, Progress Steers and Heifers. Members completed judging cards, received marks and feedback for their written reasons, and listened to the judges' oral reasons. He has won many Trainer's Challenges, including the H3 Trainers Challenge in Brandon, Manitoba, and recently surpassed \$400,000 Lifetime Earnings in the

Reined Cow Horse Event.

After lunch, Clearwater presented on continuing training with a two-year-old horse. Clearwater was available after his presentation to answer questions and everyone was excited to talk to him.

The day concluded with a presentation from Ranch Ehrlo staff about Equine Assisted Learning. They explained how Equine Assisted Learning is an amazing team building experience, but can also be used for healing for people who have experienced a trauma. 4-H'ers Place At Canadian Young Speakers for Agriculture

It was an exciting opportunity for two 4-H members.

Morgan Heidecker and Hunter Reid travelled to Toronto on November 3, to compete in at the 34th National Canadian Young Speakers for Agriculture (CYSA) competition at the Royal Agriculture Winter Fair to in Toronto, Ont. Both the members placed first in their age categories at the 4-H Saskatchewan Provincial Public Speaking Competition to earn a bursary to attend CYSA – Morgan in the Senior category and Hunter in the Intermediate.

Twenty-nine youth, between the ages of 11-24, from across the country gathered for this year's competition. In order to save time, the juniors and seniors presented their speeches in separate rooms. They were judged by a panel of three judges, who were all involved in the agriculture industry.

The senior judges were cash crop farmer George Robinson, communications consultant Karen Daynard, and Foodland Ontario Supervisor of Brand Services Kelly Ward. The junior judges were Richard Horne from Ontario Beef, Harold Rudy from Ontario soil & Crop Association and Gary Smith, a farmer and broadcaster. The Masters of Ceremonies were former CYSA winners.

The CYSA has their own rules, which are a bit different from 4-H Saskatchewan's rules, such as the time limit is five to

seven minutes for all participants with no allowance, the participants are judged out of a score of 120 points and, also, winners are not allowed to compete again. The competitors had to prepare and present a five to seven minute speech on one of seven prechosen topics relating to current Canadian agriculture issues.

The competition wrapped up by lunch and then everyone gathered for the awards ceremony, where they were greeted by the president of the Royal Fair and Ted Young, the chair of the CYSA. The top six competitors were announced during the ceremony.

Hunter placed third in the junior category. His topic was, "The Next Big Thing in Canadian Agriculture." Morgan placed in the top six for seniors and her topic was, "How can we educate consumers on agriculture and the industry standards within."

This will be Morgan's last year as a senior member of the Three Lakes 4-H Beef Club and Hunter is an intermediate member of the Saskatoon 4-H Beef Club. Both received a lot of feedback on how professional and polished their presentations were. Morgan and Hunter did an amazing job representing 4-H Saskatchewan and should be extremely proud of competing at a national level and both placing in the top six!

U.S. National 4-H Conference

Donna Cunningham

Donna Cunningham grew up in the Kelvington area and was raised on a farm surrounded by family who encouraged her love for animals, particularly horses.

After completing her degree in Education, her love for rural Saskatchewan — and her husband Darrel, who shared the same values — led them back to the family farm just south of Lintlaw. The couple had two daughters, Dara and Lisa. In 1987, when her daughters were old enough to be part of 4-H, Donna started the Pipestone Valley 4-H Club.

Donna devoted a lot of time educating herself with the Western Riding Program, the Coaching Program and eventually the Judges Program from the Saskatchewan Horse Federation. She decided to take the training to ensure she'd be fully qualified to lead teach members.

Donna has held the position of general leader since 1987. She has been instrumental in the basics of managing the 4-H program through her leadership.

One of the greatest qualities Donna demonstrates is her patience with youth of all skill levels and any 'less than perfect steeds.' Safety and safe horse handling are trademarks of her teaching skills.



To this day, several members have commented they still look to see if she is watching before ducking under the head of their tied horse. The club's achievement day was held at Donna's family farm for many years, sometimes in the middle of her garden patch.

It is easy to see how Donna's involvement in 4-H has benefited the youth in the community. She has helped them learn to ride better, develop a sense of comradery and teamwork, and take responsibility for their animals. Several former club members have gone on to careers in agriculture. She also helped grow their love of 4-H, as two of her former members became leaders with her club.

Donna was also involved in 4-H beyond the club level, sitting on the District 42 Council (1992-2017) and holding the role as president from 2012-2017. She has been a strong advocate for 4-H in the community and surrounding area. She is also the secretary/treasurer to the Kelvington Agricultural Society and has organized the Light Horse show as part of the annual fair for many years.

In Donna's spare time, she pursues her interest in writing with the Tisdale Writer's Group and is a published author. "Anything For a Nickel" is a biography she wrote of a local Lintlaw resident. She is an involved grandmother with five grandchildren and continues to be active on the family farm in addition to many other community activities.

Lisa Nestman



Lisa was born on July 27, 1964 and raised on a farm near Kayville. Her 4-H involvement began in 1974, where she was a member of the Spring Valley 4-H Beef Club. She served in various executive positions in the club, as well as took part in public speaking, curling and showing calves at the Moose Jaw Fair.

After marrying her husband, Ken, they moved to the Briercrest area where they raised their three children and still actively farm. Lisa became a part of 4-H again, as a project leader of the Briercrest 4-H Multiple Club.

From 1996 to the present, she has taught many projects, including Pee Wee, Crafts, Quilting, Let's Entertain and many more. From 2002 until 2016, Lisa was the general leader for the Briercrest 4-H Multiple Club.

Throughout this time, she made it her mission to have fun and provide old fash-ioned, traditional events for the 4-H members, including barn dances, Christmas caroling, acts of kindness, bottle drives, fashion shows and carnivals. Along with all the programming, Lisa provided guidance and mentorship to her leaders and members.

Lisa currently serves on the District 8 4-H Council as president and frequently is a judge at local 4-H public speaking events. In 2010, Lisa was named the Canadian 4-H National Volunteer Leader of the Year and, in 2011, Lisa and her daughter went on the Caribbean cruise, which was organized by the Canadian 4-H Council, where she met families from all across Canada.

In 2014, she chaperoned Canadian 4-H members who were attending the U.S. National Conference in Washington, D.C. In 2017, she was chosen to attend the 4-H Global Summit in Ottawa, where representatives from around the globe came together to celebrate 4-H. Additionally, Lisa was awarded the Canada 150 medal for volunteerism in 2017.

Lisa's impact on the 4-H community is certainly a positive one. She is well spoken and is an active member of the community. She has sat on most committees around her hometown – from the rink board to the local ladies club – all the while promoting 4-H and the need to work together to maintain the rural way of life.

She is currently a board member for the Claybank Brick Plant National Heritage Site and her local Catholic woman's league. Lisa spent many years as the librarian/secretary for the local library.

If you ask Lisa what her greatest achievement in life is, she will say, her daughters and the time she has spent with 4-H.

He has also been the representative for the Goodeve 4-H Club to the Yorkton 4-H Regional Show and Sale. For the last six years he has been a director and served on the executive.



For Wes, one of the most exciting parts of being involved in 4-H has been the privilege of seeing many young people go through the 4-H program and how it has made them excellent citizens.

Wes has not only been involved in his community through 4-H – he has also served on many other community boards. He volunteered with the Goodeve Lions Club for six years and was president for one term. He was involved in the local curling club and served as president for one term, as well as organized the annual bonspiel for many years.

4-H in Canada

Across Canada, there are **24,728 4-H members** and **7,662 4-H leaders** in **1,982 4-H clubs**! There are 14,911 girls and 9,817 boys enrolled in the program. Alberta has the highest enrollment of 4-H members (6,144), followed by Ontario (6,190) and then Saskatchewan.

The most popular projects in Canada are Beef (8,217), Horse/Pony (3,533), Dairy (2,109), Arts & Crafts (1,207), Public Speaking (595), Outdoor Living (594), A Sporting Chance (551), Veterinary (518), Small Engine (497) and Youth Leader (247).

4-H as a Global Movement

4-H is one of the largest youth organizations in the world.

Around the globe, 4-H is focused on supporting youth leaders and providing an infrastructure for positive youth development. Independent, country-led 4-H programs can be found in all corners of the globe— from Africa to Asia, 4-H is present in 70 countries!

There are close to seven million 4-H'ers worldwide. The Global 4-H Network has the goal of reaching 25 million members internationally by 2025.
