## **4-H IN CANADA**

Across Canada there are 16,985 4-H members and 8,132 4-H leaders in 1,313 4-H clubs! Saskatchewan has the third highest 4-H enrollment behind Alberta (4778) and Ontario (3305).

The membership across Canada comes from a variety of backgrounds, with 55.7% from farms, 29.6% from rural communities, and 12.4% from urban communities.

### 2022 Hall of Fame Inductees - Stanley & Susan Lock



Susan Lock was born in Regina in 1959. She grew up on a mixed farm at Assiniboia with her parents, Roy and Donna Richards and her old brother, Mark. Throughout all the activities that Susan participated in, 4-H always came to the top. She started in the Assiniboia 4-H club at the age of 9 right to 18 and loved every part of it. Susan participated with both light horse and beef. Many summers were spent at 4-H camp at the beloved camp Rayner on Diefenbaker Lake. Singing songs around the camp fire by Hitchcock's cabin, swimming and having chicken fights on the hitching post where always a great time. Susan was awarded the Toronto leadership seminar trip in 1977 through 4-H selections as well as went on a 4-H exchange trip to Colorado that same year.

Susan met many great friends at 4-H camp and one special fella that caught her eye in 1976- a young blonde man from West Central Saskatchewan by the name of Stanley Lock. After graduating high school Susan graduated from the Kelsey Institute in 1979 with her nursing degree. Susan starting work in Saskatoon before marrying Stanley in 1980 and moving to Macklin to start a life of their own. Stanley Lock was born and raised in Macklin with his parents, James and Violet, and his two younger sisters, Jennifer and Nora. He grew up on a farm 6 miles north of town, where the Lock family started farming in 1924 and still farm to this day. One of Stanley's great passions in life is working with cattle - in particular the Hereford breed. 4-H was the right fit for Stanley, as he bought his first purebred heifer in 1975, starting as a 4-H member with the Senlac club at age 10. Stanley showed in the Battleford Regional 4-H show until the age of 18 for many years.

As an older member, Stanley also enjoyed going to 4-H camp at Camp Rayner on Diefenbaker Lake, meeting many great friends and catching the eye of a young red haired lady from Southern Saskatchewan. Stanley was awarded the National Citizenship trip to Ottawa in 1976 with 4-H Selections. In 1974, Stanley went on an exchange trip to Minnesota with several other District 30 members. After graduating high school Stanley went to the University of Saskatchewan for Voc-Ag. After graduating in 1977, Stanley took a one-year heavy duty mechanic course at the Kelsey Institute.

Together they have three kids, Kimberley, Jonathan and Amy. All three of the kids enjoyed growing up on the farm and were very involved with 4-H. Stanley and Susan's roll switched from 4-H members to 4-H leaders. Stanley was the general leader for nine years, beef leader for 13 years, and district 30 president, also for nine years.

Susan was the cloverbud leader for Senlac for nine years, beef leader for 13 with Senlac and was the district 30 leader delegate to the provincial AGM for six years. Susan also was the North West regional leader delegate to the provincial board for four years. Susan was once again selected to the Toronto Leadership seminar, this time as a leader in 2000.

After being leaders in the community for years their focus has switched again from leaders to cheerleaders. Stanley and Susan now enjoy spending their time watching their grandsons play hockey and show cattle both in 4-H and in the fall shows at Lloydminster Stockade and Western National Hereford show in Red Deer.

Lock Farms now consists of 350 cows both purebred Horned and Polled Hereford and commercial cows that are Hereford based. A large amount of grain land that is used for wheat, canola, barley, oats, flax, and faba beans. Jonathan and Kaleen run a herd of purebred black and red angus cows. The Hereford and Angus bulls are sold in the Premier Hereford and Angus sale on the first Monday in February at Northern Livestock Sales in Lloydminster with great sale partners: Ayrey Family of Evesham and the Moncreiff family of Senlac.

It's an absolute honor to have nominated Stanley and Susan for a life time of hard work and dedication to their community, province, and country through the 4-H program.

#### **Duane Britow**

Duane Bristow has enjoyed a successful career in the agriculture sector, working for the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool for a number of years, before applying his skills and knowledge to his research consultancy. As a 4-H alumnus, Mr. Bristow continued to dedicate himself to the 4-H movement, playing a prominent role in the expansion of the 4-H Saskatchewan Centre "Camp Rayner," and the provincial Centennial Anniversary Celebrations in 2017. At the national level, in addition to being a member of 4-H Canada for nearly three decades, Mr. Bristow has served as a director and chair to the 4-H Canada Board of Directors, and as a trustee and chair of the Canadian 4-H Foundation



#### Les Ferguson

Les grew up near Sonningdale, NW of Saskatoon. They still lease the family farm there. Les is married to Linda and they both have lived in Saskatoon since 1970.

Les's 4-H background includes:

- 4-H beef project member for seven years
- Summer staff with the 4-H program while at university
- Coordinated the Indian 4-H program on Sask. First Nations from 1973-1993
- Board member of the Saskatchewan 4-H Foundation since 2004

Les is retired. Linda is a professor within the College of Nursing, U of S. They have four sons, two daughters-in-law, and four granddaughters



#### Bill Cooper

The Coopers have been donating to 4-H since 2007. They created the Entrepreneurial Scholarship for 4-H Members, which offers three \$3,000 scholarships to 4-H members entering or continuing in any program at any post-secondary institution. These members must demonstrate exceptional enthusiasm and awareness of the entrepreneurial concept.

Apart from their scholarship opportunities, Mr. and Mrs. Cooper have also donated annually, and provided funding for the creation of the 4-H Future Fund. This fund is managed through the Saskatchewan 4-H Foundation, and is open for additional donations, so that contributions can be made for years to come.



#### Patricia Katz

As a child, Patricia Katz twisted her mother's arm to start a 4-H Homecraft club, and once enrolled as a member she never looked back. Her club years including sewing and leadership projects, an exchange trip to lowa, being crowned Provincial Dress Review Queen, and receiving the CNE Scholarship Award at Provincial Selections. Pat worked as a Summer Assistant for the Provincial 4-H Office during her University years, was hired as a Provincial 4-H Specialist after graduating from the U of S College of Home Economics, and eventually moved into a seven year term as Provincial 4-H Supervisor. Camps, conferences and leadership events were major areas of responsibility, and Pat once calculated that she had spent two entire years of her life at Rayner Centre.

## 2022 4-H Saskatchewan — Financial Statement Highlights

Dear members of the Saskatchewan 4-H Council,

This letter has been prepared to accompany our financial statements and highlight some of the factors impacting our 2022 finances.

As you review the financial statement, you will see the Saskatchewan 4-H Council ended the 2022 year with a small loss of \$7,573.00. With the end of the Canadian Emergency Wage Subsidy and Saskatchewan 4-H returning to in-person programming, the organization resumed the operational environment of 2018 and 2019.

At the end of the second quarter of 2022, 4-H Saskatchewan posted a year-to-date loss of \$21,000. Management and the Board of Directors identified this negative financial trend and implemented cost cutting measures which limited the 2022 loss to the \$7,573.00 amount.

In order to avoid future losses, 4-H Saskatchewan has implemented the following changes:

- The number of Regional Specialists has been reduced from four to three.
- The Executive Assistant position has been eliminated.
- In person Board of Director meetings will be limited to one day. One meeting annually will be held online.
- The 4-H Fundraising Golf Tournament did not return a profit in 2022 and has been cancelled for 2023.
- The 2022 4-H provincial lottery sold very poorly. We have suspended the lottery for 2023 while
  we review the process.
- The provincial office will look to reduce printing and shipping costs wherever possible.

These changes have created a break-even budget for 2023 as the Board looks to improve our financial sustainability and work towards more systemic efficiencies that reduce costs and improve the experience for our members, leaders, and volunteers. Your Board of Directors will continue to monitor the situation to ensure 4-H Saskatchewan remains financially stable for years to come.

We look forward to formally presenting the statements in person when we come together at the 2023 Annual General Meeting and answering any questions you may have.
