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Bits & Pieces



Our participants enjoyed a dance social, before the final games on Sunday. Congratulations to the winning


teams from Provincial 4-H Curling!

4-H'ers Learn About Beef Industry At Beef Symposium



Beef Symposium 2020 was held in Swift Current on February 21 at Pattison Ag. Thirty-five members and leaders from across the province came to learn about various facets of the beef industry.

The morning began with greetings from Kaitlyn Keller, SW Regional 4-H Specialist, and Harold Martens, a board member for the Saskatchewan Cattlemen's Association. Once the members played some icebreakers, they were spilt into two groups. The morning consisted of a tour of the Pattison Ag Building, where the members learned about farm safety and the Pattison Ag Building. There was also a morning presentation from Cass Eaton and Frank Rutledge from Gibson Livestock, who spoke about cattle buying and what buyers are looking for when purchasing cattle.



After a delicious lunch, Shelby Longworth, NE Regional 4-H Specialist, and Kaitlyn Keller presented on what happens to your beef animals once they are butchered. The presentation consisted of a video explaining all the cuts of meat, and beef byproducts.

Next, participants were taught about the importance of value chains and presented their ideas on how to improve in the inputs, production, processing, and marketing aspects of the beef industry. The members were very creative, and came up with amazing concepts!

After a quick break and a fun "Choose Your Favorite Fake Mustache" game, the members remained in their groups. Alexis DeCorby with the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture presented on EPDs to one of the groups, while Shelby talked about supply and demand, identifying the parts and cuts of meat, and our favorite parts of 4-H. To end the program, everyone was split into teams for a quick game of "The Price is Right" featuring everything



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that a 4-H member would need for their project year. After much debate over the actual retail price of items, three teams emerged victorious.

Virtual Equine Symposium Teaches Valuable Skills

The final piece of the virtual symposium was Equine Nutrition, which was created by the 4-H staff. This included information about what to feed your horse, as well as information about eating disorders horses may have, such as colic.

2020 4-H Saskatchewan Annual General Meeting

The 2020 Annual General Meeting was held in July through the GoToMeeting platform. The event is typically a two-day conference and business meeting with nearly 200 attendees and guests held the third weekend in March in Saskatoon. This year it needed to be postponed due to COVID and was then transitioned to virtual events throughout July.

First, the four administrative regional council meetings were held between July 6-9. During these meetings, the regional delegates from each area elected their regional director nominees and advisory council representatives. They also discussed regional business and selected hosts for 2021 curling and public speaking events.

The business from the regional meetings was then brought forward during the Provincial Council Meeting on July 18. The theme of this year's meeting "4-H in Focus." During this meeting, the 4-H Council planned a few fun digital games, from icebreakers using a drawing feature and trivia questions to break up the business meeting.

During the meeting, member and leader voting delegates discussed and voted on a number of decisions. The auditors' report gave the membership a chance to ask questions to the board of directors and the auditor. Then the delegates voted on six resolutions this year – including three bylaw and three policy resolutions.

The bylaw resolutions made housekeeping changes to when balloted votes are required, and extended the board of directors terms of service from two years to three years. The policy resolutions were around how many animals Cloverbud members in the beef project should raise, digital record books being used in record book competitions and where funds from dissolved clubs should be donated.

The membership also provided input for the revised strategic plan for 4-H Saskatchewan. Using mentimeter.com, delegates shared their thoughts on "What does the future of 4-H look like?" and "What does 4-H need to thrive in the future?"


The 2020/2021 4-H Saskatchewan Ambassadors were elected into their positions during the regional meeting portion of AGM in early July 2020.

Virtual Summer Camp: Fun From Your Own Home

Although they couldn't meet in person, fun was had by all at camp this year.

Virtual 4-H Summer Camp was held August 17-21 through the GoToMeeting platform, along with pre-recorded YouTube videos. About 25 members registered and attended the sessions they were able to throughout the week.

The week started with a "Get To Know You" day on Monday, with the first session being mainly introductions, a brief overview of what camp would look like and a couple virtual icebreaker games. The second live session was filled with fun online games, such as Jeopardy, Pictionary and Rate It! Then, in the evening, campers enjoyed campfire songs and a fun story by John Paul involving a time-travelling lumberjack. Although it was a challenge to coordinate singing voices through the online platform, the campers still had fun.

Tuesday was Science & Technology day. In the morning, campers played a fun "Sink or Float" experiment, with campers making predictions about what they thought each item would do. They then participated in a virtual owl pellet dissection, which they could all do at home on their own devices.

In the afternoon, campers learned about habitats and went on their own microhike. Rather than walking a long distance, campers moved very slowly along a short distance, looking closely for small objects. Afterwards, campers shared their experiences and what they saw during their "hike." The day finished off in the evening with an astronomy and the science of light lesson. Campers then were sent out to map the stars in their own backyards.

Wednesday was Sustainable Agriculture & Food Security day. The morning session saw campers learn how to make pizza dough and made their own pizzas for lunch. While waiting for the dough to proof, they learned about wheat production, played some gardening charades and had a tour of the University of Saskatchewan gardening website.

In the second live session of the day, campers enjoyed an activity based around Nutrien's Journey 2050. John Paul explained the idea of a triple bottom line and then had the campers choose and purchase a crop. As the game progressed and campers made money, the opportunity to invest in their operation arose, such as purchasing livestock, putting money into research and development, improving irrigation, and more. In the evening, the campers didn't have a live session and were instead challenged to have a family night.

Community Engagement & Communications was Thursday's theme. The morning session had campers reporting on their family night experiences, participating in a scavenger hunt and writing thank you cards for community members.

For the afternoon session, campers created story cubes to help them with creative writing. They also learned about parts of speech, such as verbs, nouns, adjectives and adverbs, before playing some mad lib games. The session concluded with story prompts and had them writing their own stories.

The day finished with the talent show! Campers had the option to send in prerecorded videos or perform live. There were many amazing talents showcased! A virtual camp worked to many of the campers' advantage as they could use props or other family members.

The final day of camp was Environment & Healthy Living Day. The first session was based around Nutrien's Caring For Our Watersheds. After watching some introductory videos from Nutrien, campers created their own watershed forts. They then participated in a brainstorming session designed to mimic the Caring for our Watersheds process.

The afternoon focused on survival skills. The campers learned about shelter, fires, water and food from a series of videos created by Clint Panter and about basic first aid from Jodi. Then campers were then encouraged to create their own sun dials and check out the orienteering skill video.

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In addition to the live sessions, campers also had the opportunity to check out the prerecorded skills sessions, which were emailed out to campers each morning after the first session.

The skills sessions included:

- Arts & Crafts rock painting, pour painting, tape resist painting, sunset painting and friendship
- Sports & Fitness fitness videos, wacky sports, line dancing
- Cooking garlic pull apart bread, microwave brownies, smashed potatoes, ice cream in a bag, eggs, rice krispy squares
- Nature Walk learning about parts of nature, orienteering
- Science Experiments fireworks in a jar, sunscreen painting, soap science, shaving cream clouds, apple experiment, magic milk experiment

Although it was a different type of camp, the members all had fun. Many of the campers said they will continue using the videos and work on fun skills after camp.

Thank you to our title sponsor, Nutrien, for making it possible to hold this camp and making it free for our 4-H members. Thank you to all of our 4-H members who signed up and attended camp sessions. No matter if you are just starting your 4-H journey or have been around for a while, this was a great opportunity to learn more about an unfamiliar project or skill! We certainly learned plenty!



Donnett Elder

Donnett Morrow grew up on the family farm in Page County, Iowa. Her parents, George and Edwena Morrow were 4-H leaders, who were honoured by the 4-H Page County Citizenship Award as long-time leaders and contributors to the 4-H youth of Page County. Donnett and her five siblings each completed eight years as 4-H members.

Donnett attended university, studying Home Economics and Psychology. Donnett was a chaperone for the first 4-H Exchange between the Page County in Iowa and Weyburn 4-H District in Saskatchewan. Donnett joined three other chaperones and 38 4-H members from Page County for the exchange trip to Saskatchewan.

The International 4-H Exchange program was founded in 1959, by Harry-Jae Elder from Fillmore, Sask. The focus was to broaden 4-H members' knowledge of another country and culture. Both areas were agriculture based with extensive 4-H programs, which provided the participants with interesting, rich experiences while staying with wonderful host families. Donnett was billeted with a family south of Weyburn. A romance unfolded between Donnett and Harry-Jae through a year and half of letter writing and the return exchange of the Weyburn 4-H District members to Page County, Iowa. Donnett and Harry-Jae were married in College Springs, Iowa in December 1960. The founder of 4-H in the United States, Mrs. Jesse Field Shambaugh from Clarinda, Iowa attended their wedding. Donnett and Harry-Jae farmed north east of Fillmore. They have five children, 10 grandchildren, four great grandchildren. They hosted six exchange students from Mexico, Japan and France for up to a year, as well as 4-H exchange students. Harry-Jae was inducted into the 4-H Hall of Fame in 1999.

Donnett was a 4-H leader for 29 years in the Fillmore 4-H Club, teaching sewing, advanced sewing, crocheting, outdoorsman, photography, cooking and Spotlight on the World. Each 4-H member brought interesting experiences to their project. All the activities were enjoyable, from making a buddy burner to cook toast and eggs to bannock on a caragana stick over a bonfire with 10-year old boys or teaching teenagers to sew lovely dresses, blouses, trench coats, sheets, towels to pizza cooking, and origami folding. Photography brought in-depth study of light and subject. Spotlight on the World was an exceptional project with eight girls selecting the country of Israel one year, Haiti the next, and trips to visit the Hadassah ladies in Regina was certainly a highlight. An International Tea was held by inviting ladies from different cultures in the community as guests.

Donnett also judged at 4-H achievement days for 35 years throughout Saskatchewan. Some of her other contributions to her community include: Weyburn Central School Board Trustee, Family Farm Foundation Director, Farm Stress Line Advisory Chair, Conducted Farm Stress-Coping with Stress Workshops 1986 – 2001, Sask Water Corporation Director, Saskatchewan Wetland Conservation Corporation Director, Judge at Agriculture Fairs 50 years and being Honoured by Saskatchewan Agriculture as one of 200 Leading Agriculturalist for Saskatchewan first 100 Years - "Saskatchewan Agriculture Lives Present & Past" by Series Editor Brian Mlazgar in 2006.



Blaine Harland

Blaine Harland's 4-H experience began in 1971, when he joined the Fort Pitt Beef Club at the age of 10. Thus began a lifelong commitment to the 4-H program. Following his years as a member, Blaine stayed involved in 4-H, first as a volunteer and then as a leader, a role he held until 2017. 4-H has long been a priority for the Harland family, with Blaine's mom, Pat, being a member of

the Fort Pitt Beef Club from 1951-1956 and a leader from 1972-1983.

Blaine put the skills he learned during his years in 4-H to good use. Leadership and public speaking skills were a great asset during his 38 year career in the oil and gas industry, where Blaine held various senior management positions. His 4-H cattle judging skills led to opportunities to judge many local shows, including Agribition, Edmonton Farm Fair and Saskatoon Mexabition. The highlight of Blaine's judging career was the World Simmental Show in Calgary. His leadership skills from 4-H also helped Blaine during his years as a director on the Lloydminster Agricultural Exhibition Association board, where he served on the 4-H Expo Committee and the Stockade Roundup Committee. Blaine also coached minor hockey in Paradise Hill for a number of years and is currently a member of the Turtleford Summer Cattle Show Committee.

Shelly, Blaine's wife, also volunteered many hours of her time to the 4-H program. Their three children, Chad, Jill and Bethany, were members of the Paradise Hill 4-H Multi Club, excelling in showing, judging, public speaking and record book competitions.

Some examples of Blaine's special contributions include hosting beef project meetings, fall and spring weigh days, as well as pre-achievement day clipping and showmanship clinics. Blaine and Shelly also co-ordinated the sale of the members' fed steers at the St. Walburg Regional Show. They found buyers for the steers and handled the bidding on sale day on behalf of the buyers. This ensured the steers sold for a fair price both, which with the members and buyers were happy. Blaine also personally delivered the steers to the processing plants for the buyers after the sale and would even feed them for a week or two if the processing plant needed more time – all at no charge to the members.

Despite his busy schedule, Blaine always took time to help any member of the club who needed assistance, showing them how to train a calf to lead or how to best clip a calf, as well as encouraging members to try new ways of doing things. Blaine also enjoyed organizing many educational tours for the members. Working with family on the Little Willow Creek Ranch holds a special place for Blaine and Shelly. Along with his parents, Ervin and Pat, his brothers, Scott and Ted, and their wives, Bev and Adele, the family runs a large ranch in the Frenchman Butte area, featuring Simmental cattle. Thanks to the many hours Shelly spends heat detecting, Blaine especially enjoys his time artificial inseminating cows and he always looks forward to calving season.

Over the years, Blaine's commitment to 4-H gave hundreds of members the opportunity to learn from his positive influence and extensive knowledge base. On behalf of all the members and their families, thank you, Blaine!

External workshops were led by Clinton Monchuk of Farm and Food Care Saslatchewan, who delivered a modified version of the Speak Up workshop, and Karen Smith of the Ministry of Agriculture, who delivered a "What's in your Lunchbox" activity and a Career Exploration talk.

There was also a number of tables set up for clubs to showcase their club displays, with the Viscount 4-H Beef Club "Shoot the Cow" activity being a big hit with the younger members. The members greatly enjoyed talking about their clubs and the things that they have accomplished over the 4-H year. Thank you to all the volunteers and clubs that helped make this day so successful! We hope to be able to host another workshop like this in the future!

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Clover Corner

To start off our STEMing To The Future 4-H Year, here are a couple fun science experiments you can try at home! STEM stands for science, technology, engineering and math, which fits under the Science & Technology Leadership Development pillar.

Dyed Flowers

Materials:

- 3 White Carnations, Roses or Daises
- 3 Bottles of Food Coloring in Assorted Colors
- 3 Clear 16 oz Plastic Cups
- Water
- Scissors

Instructions:

- Fill each cup with water half way. Add 3 drops of food coloring into each of the cups. Each cup should be a different color.
- 2. Carefully cut the end of each of the flower's stem.
- 3. Place each stem in a different colored water cup.
- 4. Wait one hour and observe your flowers' petals.
- 5. Wait one day and observe your flowers' petals.

How it Works:

 The Xylem of the flower works like an elevator and brings the water from the cup all the way up the plant's stem and into the plant's petals. When it brings the dyed water up it ends up dying the plant's petals. The Xylem is what allows the plant to get water from the roots all the way to the petals.



Rock Candy

Materials:

- A wooden skewer
- A clothespin
- 1 cup of water
- 2-3 cups of sugar
- A tall narrow glass or jar

Instructions:

- 1. Clip the wooden skewer into the clothespin so that it hangs down inside the glass and is about 1 inch (2.5 cm) from the bottom of the glass. (as shown)
- 2. Remove the skewer and clothespin and put them aside for now and get a helpful adult!
- Pour the water into a pan and bring it to boil. Pour about 1/4 cup of sugar into the boiling water, stirring until it dissolves.
- 4. Keep adding more and more sugar, each time stirring it until it dissolves, until no more will dissolve. This will take time and patience and it will take longer for the sugar to dissolve each time. Be sure you don't give up too soon. Once no more sugar will dissolve, remove it from heat and allow it to cool for at least 20 minutes.
- Have your helpful ADULT carefully pour the sugar solution into the jar almost to the top. Then

- submerge the skewer back into the glass making sure that it is hanging straight down the middle without touching the sides.
- 6. Allow the jar to fully cool and put it someplace where it will not be disturbed. Now just wait. The sugar crystals will grow over the next 3-7 days.
- 7. Want colored rock candy? Add food coloring to your sugar water and make sure sure that it is pretty dark in color for the best result.

How it Works:

 When you mixed the water and sugar you made a SUPER SATURATED SOLUTION. This means that the water could only hold the sugar if both were very hot. As the water cools the sugar "comes out" of the solution back into sugar crystals on your skewer. The skewer (and sometimes the glass itself) act as a "seed" that the sugar crystals start to grow on. With some luck and patience you will have a tasty scientific treat! Enjoy!



Important Policy Changes In 2020

This year, there have been some important policy changes. Here is a brief overview of some of these changes.

Changes to volunteer screening renewal

- 4-H Saskatchewan will require leaders to complete volunteer screening every three years. This change will
 ensure we meet national 4-H Canada guidelines. This will be rolled out starting this year, so will not affect
 leaders and volunteers until they need to renew their screening, or if they are new to the organization and
 completing screening for the first time. Below are two examples:
 - If you completed volunteer screening in 2018, your screening is valid for five years until 2023. You will be notified to re-screen then, and your renewed screening will be valid for three years.
 - If you get screened in 2020, your screening is valid for three years, and you will be notified to re-screen
 in 2023.
- If you need to complete your volunteer screening this year, you and your general leader will receive a letter of notification before August 1. You can also call the 4-H Saskatchewan office to check on your own volunteer screening status anytime.

Screening deadline change

- The new deadline to submit volunteer screening will be October 15 annually. This new date will ensure that all leaders and volunteers are screened BEFORE working with youth in our organization. Packages will be available in early July, so as to ensure volunteers have ample time before the deadline. Please ensure that all new and returning volunteers are aware of the change and begin their screening as soon as possible.
- Those who have never been a leader or volunteer before do not need to complete their screenign by October 15. They must complete their screenign within 60 days of becoming involved in 4-H.

NEW National Youth Safety policies

 4-H Canada has developed new Youth Safety policies to set national standards on volunteer screening, leader training, the Rule of Two, supervision ratios for 4-H events, transportation requirements, overnight event and accommodation requirements, and other important topics. This policy document will clarify youth safety guidelines and assist leaders in navigating changes that they might need to implement in their 4-H clubs.

NEW National Youth Safety Training

- All leaders in Canada will receive new Youth Safety Training to help them become familiar with the Youth Safety policy information. This training was created by 4-H Canada with assistance from provincial organizations, to be tailored to our 4-H leaders' specific needs. The training will be delivered by our own 4-H Saskatchewan regional 4-H specialists so it will also have information and scenarios unique to our to Saskatchewan clubs.
 - For the 2020/2021 year, at least two leaders per club must complete the training to register your club. 4-H Saskatchewan recommends that your club determines at least two leaders who will complete the training, so that they can do this over the summer before your club reorganizes in the fall.
 - For the following year, all leaders must complete the training in order to register as a leader in the 2021/2022 4-H year
- This training will be about two hours in length and will hosted weeknights throughout August and September.
 To make these sessions readily available for all leaders, there will be either live, interactive sessions or pre-recorded sessions to choose between. More information on the specific dates and logistics around leader training will be available in mid-July.

Commit to Kids Training Mandatory

• Last year each club required two leaders at a minimum to complete the Commit to Kids Abuse prevention training. To register as a leader in 2020/2021, ALL leaders must complete this training. This online training takes approximately 2.5 hours to complete and requires a 4-H LEARNS account to access.

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4-H Canada News

In 1967, Carm received the Canadian Centennial Medal and was a recipient of the Queen Elizabeth II Golden Jubilee Medal in 2002.

Kim McConnell of Alberta has been giving back to his community since his days in Hamiota, Manitoba's McConnell 4-H Beef Club, the longest continually active 4-H club in Canada. He is a catalyst for the advancement of agri-food and is a founder of AdFarm, one of the largest agricultural marketing communications firms in North America.

Since 2008, Kim has dedicated himself to positions on the Canadian 4-H Foundation and the 4-H Canada Board of Directors, where he has been influential in the growth of the 4-H movement in Canada, while ensuring 4-H youth have a voice at the national level of the organization and in the agriculture sector.

The 4-H Saskatchewan Hall of Fame was created in 1985, to recognize individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the 4-H program in Saskatchewan in a volunteer capacity.

Hall of Fame inductees will be invited to the Saskatchewan 4-H Council Annual General Meeting banquet in March 2021 in Saskatoon (if it can be held) and be formally inducted.

To be eligible for this recognition, recipients must have made an outstanding volunteer contribution to 4-H (not including in the capacity of a paid staff person); served the 4-H movement for at least 15 years for past leaders and 30 years for current leaders. Preference is given to those who have served beyond the club level. Nominations may originate with a club, District 4-H Council or the Saskatchewan 4-H Council or 4-H individual and must be approved by the district.

Nomination forms can be downloaded on the 4-H website under Resources or call the Provincial 4-H Office at 306-933-7727 to have one mailed or ask your regional specialist at your district meeting.

The nomination form must be received by the Provincial 4-H Office by December 31, 2020.



Rayner Center no longer exists, however the Saskatchewan 4-H Foundation remains an integral part of the 4-H program as the charitable branch of the organization, raising funds to provide an annual operating grant and supporting 4-H programming.

We were fortunate to celebrate this milestone with many 4-H alumni at the Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities (SARM) Annual Convention, on March 10, 2020 while MLA Lyle Stewart also made an announcement at the Legislature to commemorate the anniversary.

The Act states that there must be representatives from both the University of Saskatchewan College of Agriculture and the Saskatchewan Ministry of Agriculture on the Foundation board of trustees, in addition to representative from the 4-H program.

We would like to thank all of the trustees who have supported the Foundation with their knowledge over the past sixty years and thank all of the donors who have shown their support in ensuring the long-term sustainability of the 4-H program in Saskatchewan.

Big River garden builds stronger community

It was 2017.

Members of the Big River Multiple 4-H Club were taking part in 4-H Saskatchewan's Journey 2050 program, which prompted them to think about the future and the challenges of feeding a growing global population.

Eventually, all those thoughts coalesced into a single idea that would both meet this challenge, and allow the club to adhere to its mandate to give back to others: a community garden that would be open to everyone, rather allowing people to rent or own their own plots like other community gardens.

In April of 2017, the Big River 4-H presented its idea to the Town of Big River, which got behind the notion in a big way. "It started there," said Niki Panter, who oversees the garden's Facebook group, Green 4 Big River. "They loved the idea, and they donated a lot for us to start on. That was the biggest step to get it going." Panter adds that the garden is based on the simple notion of doing a small favour in return for a small favour.

"The 4H club runs it an oversees everything there, but we get everyone involved," she said. "If you want to receive produce from it, we ask for help to weed the garden, water, and make sure everything is good there."

Three years in, Panter says the community of Big River is loving the garden and showing plenty of support for the initiative. She also feels like it's achieving its goals of building a sense of community within the town, and getting everybody involved. This, she adds, is especially true for local seniors. "We made it to accommodate them, with raised garden beds that are waist high. It made it really convenient," she said.

"We wanted something to help the community and get everybody involved. And it does. It brings children out. It brings the seniors out. It keeps us like a family." This year, despite the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the community garden is actually bigger than ever, thanks to funding the garden received through Lake Country Coop's Fuel Good Days initiative.



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That funding allowed for the construction of more garden beds, and even a little 4H sign for the garden. It also greatly increased the variety of produce on offer.

"We were able to go from minimal stuff, to having potatoes, peas, carrots, beans, lettuce, kale, squash, beets, radishes, cauliflower, broccoli, cabbage, peppers, pumpkins, spinach, cucumbers, and herbs. The list is just endless, which is really awesome."

Beyond the support of the Town of Big River and Lake Country Co-op, Panter says the garden has also been fortunate to receive help from Clearwater Greenhouses, which donated vegetables to this year's crop.

The Highway 55 Football team also pitched in, building a shed for the garden, and students who came to the community via an exchange program in 2019 helped with the residing and painting of the shed.

Going forward, Panter says she hopes the community will keep the garden going, even after the 4H kids grow up and move on.

"We do appreciate everything from the community. We'd like to thank everybody who has ever helped and continues to help," she said.

"That's the most that we ask for, is just to support each other and keep doing this. It makes our community stronger."

District 7 Awards Scholarships To Deserving Members

The Patti Underwood Memorial Scholarship (formally known as District #7 Scholarship) is available each spring to members actively in 4-H for 3+ years and are involved in clubs within the District #7 area.

The 2020 recipients have been awarded to members Brandy Fettes of Radville 4-H Beef Club and Shayla Moore of Brokenshell Multiple Club. Both members have been members for 13 years and very deserving of this grant.

Brandy Fettes will be attending Olds College completing Business Management Certificate program and Shayla Moore will be attending University of Saskatchewan completing Bachelor of Science in Agriculture.

District #7 President Brittany Stepp awarded these members in August and wished them both all the success in their future endeavours. Typically this award is presented to members during the Weyburn Show & Sale in July, however due to COVID-19 this was cancelled and 4-H events were restricted to club level only.
